Recently, five college students created a project to determine how high school students feel about immigrants since the September 11 terrorist attacks. These college students were instructed by their teacher to interview students from several different high schools and produce a video to show what they learned. Ultimately, they decided to hold a discussion between immigrant and native students in school libraries.

The college students learned suburban students knew very little about immigrants and the effect 9/11 might have on them. Reactions from suburban students were quite different. Some native students were angry at immigrants and religious minorities. Others showed concern for the safety of immigrants. Most immigrant students were worried about themselves and their families.

At one high school the group was not allowed to hold its discussion because the administrator was worried that it would create tension and resentment between immigrant and non-immigrant students. The school had already experienced problems in the past and the college students noticed that "non-white" students were often checked more carefully at the school entrance.
